ROOM 218: Leader: MARGARET SUTHERLAND: Title- "The evolving nature of adult education" Specific questions to discuss:

- 1. What major social and economic trends do you foresee in the next decade, which will require new curricula in adult learning?
- 2. Is the distinction between more theoretical approaches and more practical approaches to adult learning (e.g. music appreciation and music making) a valid one and should these forms of adult learning be separated or not?

ROOM 221: Leader: LESLEY DOYLE: Title- "The place and provision of universities in adult education" Specific questions to discuss:

- 1. If adult education departments disappear in their present form, will universities be forced to reinvent them in a different form in the future?
- 2. Despite their increasing numbers, are adult learners still outsiders in the academy?

ROOM 224: Leader JOHN TIBBITT: Title - "Universities and community engagement"

Specific questions to discuss:

- 1. What has happened to the 'third mission' and civic role of universities?
- 2. Is there a growth of adult learning provision by alternative providers and self-learning groups and if so, what are the implications for a university school of education?
